This table, titled "Reliability of Survey Measures Used in the Present Study," provides a detailed accounting of the sources and content of the variables used in that study, along with additional selected information pertaining to their use. The reliability values reported are based on a 'hybrid' estimate in which reliabilities are based on polychoric correlation/covariances for ordinal variables and conventional Pearson-based correlation and covariances are used for interval-level variables.
